Welcome to the Twelfth BRAYCE Newsletter

BRAYCE is currently preparing to welcome five young Brazilians to participate in the BRAYCE Cultural Exchange Program at Camp Hazen. Rafael (Fez) Guerra, from Jardim America in Rio de Janeiro, will return as Assistant Waterfront Director; Edvilson Neto from Paraty returns as an Associate Counselor to be joined by classmate Thuane Sendreti, who will join the Leadership Training Level I program. Pauline Batista, whom many of you know well by now, is in her freshman year at Mitchell College, New London, will be a volunteer counselor. Also from Rio, Bruno Leonardo de Araújo, from the favela of Bráz de Pina, will become the first “camper” to attend Camp Hazen. We hope the experience will greatly improve his language skills enabling him to return in 2012 as a Leadership Training participant. From the USA, Annie Denton from Connecticut College (2011) will intern in the Bráz de Pina favela for two months where she will assume responsibilities established by last summer’s interns Susan Beaty and Mary Liz Van Nes.

Samba Rio :The popular annual BRAYCE fundraiser, Samba Rio, was held at St. Joseph’s Parish Center on February 19, 2011. Guests danced the night away to the Brazilian beat of José Paulo’s band and Eric Galm’s fabulous drumming group from Trinity College. Exotic Brazilian entertainer, Quenia Ribeiro, dazzled everyone as she led guests in festive Samba moves.

Thuane is also a small boat sailing instructor which will enable her to make a very useful contribution to Camp life.

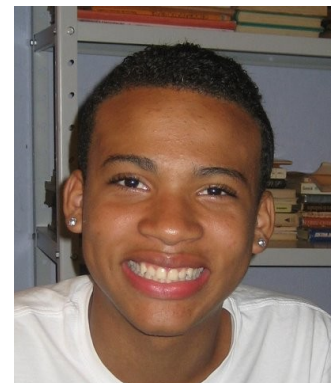

Bruno de Araújo lives in the community of Bráz da Pina, in Rio. BRAYCE has been providing English lessons to prepare him for his American adventure. He is in ninth grade, loves music and is an accomplished drummer. Bruno is proud of his city: "Rio de Janeiro has several nice places to visit. The first thing I recommend is the Christ the Redeemer (The huge statue of Christ atop the high hill known as Corcovado) which is now one of the seven Wonders of the World. The second is Sugar Bread (Loaf), also very beautiful and much visited by tourists worldwide. And the third is the slums. They are not so much visited, but this is where you know the whole culture of Rio de Janeiro. These are places I know and I think it's cool to know". Bruno will be BRAYCE's first camper at Camp Hazen. He is very excited and looking forward to making new friends.
